LITTLE FREE LIBRARY PROJECT:

GFWC Treadwell Community Improvement Club (TCIC) took the initiative to create a gathering place where neighbors could share their favorite books, magazines, and other items. A volunteer hand-crafted a "Little Free Library", which was then painted by a local 7th grader with the words "Need a book - Take a book; Have a book - Leave a book". A local carpenter volunteered to mount the library near Treadwell's Community Gazebo. TCIC president submitted a grant request through the ALK Supplemental Trust fund to subscribe to Ranger Rick, JR, Kind News, National Geographic for Kids, and Highlights (Age 6-12). The request was approved and the magazine subscriptions are placed in the little free library for area families to enjoy. This project allowed families access to educational material, which they may not have be able to access in any other way.

LEGO MANIA - KECC utilized A.L. Kellogg Supplemental Account funding to offer "Legos On the Move" program which included collaborative work on selected vehicle kits. Eighteen students, three pre-schoolers, and 10 parents participated in this program. Lego checkers and Lego tic-tac-toe games were played and the children's final creations were placed on display at the center. All participants were given a smaller vehicle kit to bring home and craft with their families.

GROOVIN' IN THE GARDEN - Storie Laurie, Laurie McIntosh, brought her engaging storytelling music to share her love of words and music.

TWIST N' TROUT - Ira McIntosh utilized music to present a program on how water usage and the watershed affects our lives.
